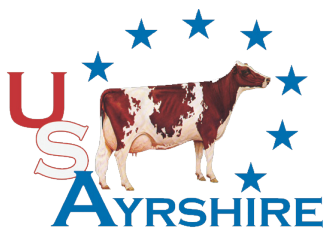

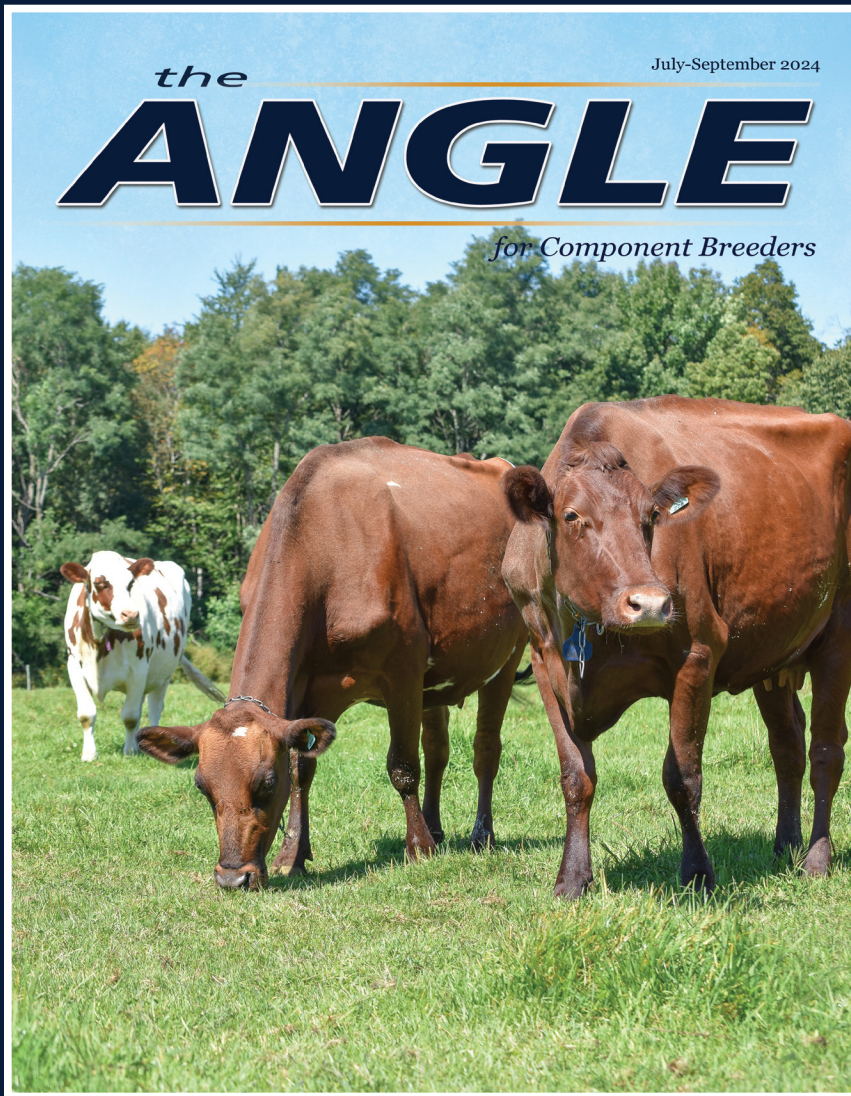

Alongside her brother Kasen, Allie has achieved significant success in showing. Notably, she won her heat and made it to the finals in showmanship at WDE in 2023 and placed 2nd in the Open and Junior Show with Krauses Tanbark Ida P, who was also named Honorable Mention Junior Champion at NAILE 2023. Another highlight includes Krauses Cecilia Mille being named Reserve Intermediate Champion of the Junior Show at NAILE 2022. Additionally, Allie won Supreme Champion Heifer of the Northeast Texas Junior Show with her heifer, Krauses Money Mikala.

Mikayla Krause has been a pivotal figure in Allie's dairy show journey. Teaching her everything from preparing cows to showing in showmanship, Mikayla's mentorship has been instrumental in Allie's success.

Looking ahead, Allie plans to stay deeply involved in dairy farming. She aims to continue developing her animals into productive cows that also excel in shows. Her goal is to showcase her milking cows and highlight their quality and productivity.

Words of Wisdom

For those looking to follow in her footsteps, Allie offers valuable advice: get involved and put in the hard work at home. The effort invested in preparation at home correlates with success in the show ring.

INTRODUCING 305-AA

The New Standardized Yield Measurement

Since 1994, the dairy industry has compared cows in different lactations, geographical regions and breeds using the current 305-ME (Mature Equivalent) adjustments. This production estimation standardizes milk, fat, and protein yields to a 305-day lactation at a mature equivalent status regardless of a cow's current age.

In 1995, a scientific paper was authored by Norman et al and published in the Journal of Dairy Science outlining how genetic selection changes maturity patterns. With this knowledge, the variables impacting the equation used in the 305-ME estimations were re-evaluated by USDA's Animal Genomics and Improvement Laboratory (AGIL) and the Council on Dairy Cattle Breeding (CDCB) this past year after 30 years.

Because of CDCB's stewardship of the National Cooperator Database, the dataset utilized in this project includes 101.5 million milk records, 100.5 million fat records, and 81.2 million protein records!

The result of this study is the introduction of 305-AA – a yield estimation standardized to a 305-day lactation record at 36 months of age – and the discontinuation of 305-ME in August.

Estimating New Standardized Yields

Before diving into the variables that have changed, it is important to note that two remain unchanged – standardizing lactations to a 2X milking frequency and the methodology for accounting for previous days open. So, what variables have been improved?

1. **Season-Region:** Production is impacted by the geographical region where cows reside and the seasons' weather patterns. These types of impacts are mitigated for comparison's sake through the standardization of data. Previously, cows were grouped into three geographical regions based on the herd code associated with the production record. In the new 305-AA formula, five climate-based regions are utilized accounting for cows residing in the hottest to coldest parts of the US.

2. **Breed Impact:** Previously, breed adjustments were calculated along with the season-region and age-parity adjustments, but now the breed-age-parity and season-region effects are estimated separately as two different multiplicative factors. When computing PTAs over the past thirty years, age-parity adjustments

for smaller population breeds – like Ayrshire and Milking Shorthorn – were heavily influenced by Holstein data but are now better estimated using their own data from recent years.

3. **Standardized Age:** The most visible change in the implementation of 305-AA is the evolution from Mature Equivalent (ME) to Average Age (AA). According to the 1994 report by Schutz that outlined the variables most recently utilized in 305-ME, Ayrshire cows reach mature production in the fourth lactation at 72 to 77 months of age and Milking Shorthorn cows in the sixth lactation at 76-86 months of age. This maturity value varies by breed.

Based on industry trends of today, the average cow in the US herd is three years old, meaning that most cows never reach their mature equivalent age outlined in the 1994 report. Without achieving this age, it is not informative to compare cows at a mature equivalent status. Therefore, 305-AA standardizes lactations to 36 months, regardless of breed, to give a more realistic comparison of cows in the US.

Impact on PTAs

At the time of this writing, the impact of this evolution from 305-ME to 305-AA on Predicted Transmitting Abilities (PTAs) is still being validated. Test runs of the new 305-AA model utilizing phenotypic data from April suggest a small reranking of bulls will take place, alongside a visible impact on trait values in each breed. The preliminary genomic data suggests stability in yield traits – milk, fat, and protein – for Ayrshire animals which will not result in large impacts to indices that heavily incorporate these traits like Net Merit \$.

Bottom Line

Dairy producers rely on a variety of measurements to compare animals of different ages, geographical locations, and breeds. Whether by using Net Merit \$ to measure the economic potential of a cow's genetics, Breed Age Average (BAA) to compare type conformation or the new 305-AA for yield traits, each is a tool designed to help producers make informed decisions.

Milking Shorthorn History Highlights

Celebrating AMSS through the decades...

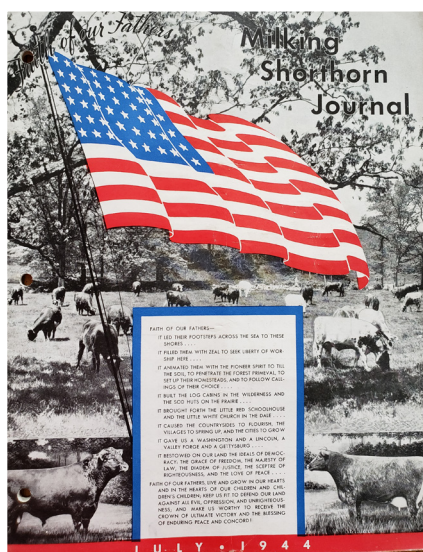
1944

President Noran Shaver (Marcia Shaver-Floyd's dad) presided over the national meeting. W. J. Hardy, Executive Secretary, reported that the long advocated "Grading Up" program was adopted by the AMSS membership. Members adopted a plan similar to the "Grading Up" program in England that would allow those with grade cattle to elevate them to purebred status.

- 1st Cross = 50%
- 2nd Cross = 75%
- 3rd Cross = 87.5%
- 4th Cross = 93.75%
- 5th Cross = 96.875%

The controversy centered around two subjects:

1) The decision to adopt (along with the other major dairy breeds) the "Standard Dairy Classification" at the Waterloo and Chicago

Shows. Up until this time the AMSS continued the beef standards for showing i.e. classes for a pair of calves, three cows in milk, yearling herd, etc.

2) The second subject involved the prorating of premium money and equalized freight. Both those practices were dropped for the 1954 Waterloo show...and so did the number of state herds. Folks were up in arms. Members reached a compromise after "much cussing and discussion." They adopted the standard Dairy Classification class descriptions to follow all other dairy breeds AND state herd money, put up by AMSS, would be paid on a mileage basis.

1964

National Futurity "Lucky #7"

Futurity Chairman Kitchell Sayre really went above and beyond to make this class a special celebration. Thirty-one entries, with nineteen shown, paraded around three judges. Dr. Fred Foreman, John C. Gage, and Stuart Rowe placed the young cows. Everyone won a prize ranging from bushels of certified oats to souvenir dice.

1974

A sale of 50 Milking Shorthorns - males and females- at the Uniontown, Alabama sale barn was an experiment. They sold along with 100 head of Jerseys and between 900 and 1000 feeder cattle. It attracted the largest crowd of the season in an area of the country that was starved for cattle. As Secretary Harry Clappitt reasoned, it was impossible to evaluate whether or not it was a success. But, he did admit we made a lot of new friends, many acquaintances, and did a heck of a positive promotional impact. Kudos to the breeders who braved the terrible road conditions...more than a few heard the raging semi drivers through the icy, rough terrain over the CB radio, "Get that bossie wagon outta my way."

1984

Changing of the Guard

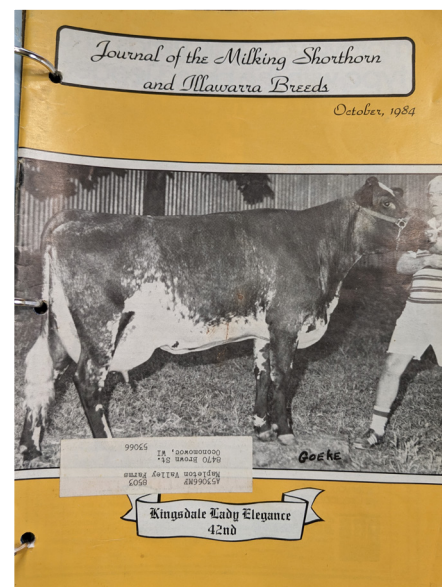
Stuart Rowe named Brad Ellsworth the new AMSS secretary. A bit of history about the six secretaries prior to Mr. Ellsworth. In the early 20's, Roy Cook, the first AMSS Executive Secretary, worked out of his home in Independence, Iowa.

W. J. Hardy (Bill), an Englishman, succeeded him as number two. Bill had immigrated with a shipment of imported dairy Shorthorns. During his reign AMSS split from the Shorthorn Association and moved from Chicago to Springfield, Missouri.

In 1960 Bill Dixon took the reins after Hardy's death. Then in 1961, Ray Schooley, a recent Kansas State graduate, became our fourth secretary. He delighted Milking Shorthorn breeders by marrying the daughter of one of our breeders. They then moved on to start a Jersey herd.

Harry Clappitt came aboard in 1967. He had a flair for writing and stressed the "milk" in Milking Shorthorns.

Marvin Kruse followed Harry in 1981. He was known for his promotion efforts. Now, in 1984, we have Brad Ellsworth, a lawyer by profession and a cattleman at heart.



2024 MCKOWN MASTER BREEDER AWARD PRESENTED TO MAPLE-DELL FARM

Family, tradition, and love for the Ayrshire breed are pillars of Maple-Dell Farm of Woodbine, Md. The generational farm owned and operated by David Patrick and his wife Ann, along with their two sons Mike and Denny, and a grandson, Derek was selected by the Klussendorf Association as this year's recipient of the Robert "Whitey" McKown Master Breeder Award. Exceptional dairy cattle breeders are awarded the title, and embody attributes associated with the Klussendorf award including character, ability, endeavor, and sportsmanship. The Patrick family is distinguished for their success in breeding excellent Ayrshires and the positive image they've established for their family farm.

The dairy farm's beginnings date back to 1928. However, it wasn't until 1941 that David Patrick's father bought him two Ayrshire calves which sparked a passion and love for the breed. Just 14 years later, the two calves had developed into a herd of 45 registered Ayrshires. The family now farms 1,200 acres, milks 165 cows, and raises over 160 heifers in the same location where it all began. The herd has been production testing for over 60 years and classified for 40, with the ultimate goal of getting productive cows with solid feet and legs and high scoring udder traits. Maple-Dell Farm earned the title of the Ayrshire Association's Master Breeder in 2010 and 14 constructive breeder awards for the herd's outstanding production and type. It's undeniable their breeding program is an indisputable success, with their pre-fix Md-Maple-Dell.



The Maple-Dell herd has proven instrumental to the Ayrshire breed, setting a high bar for quality cattle. Over 100 cows in their herd have been classified as Excellent, with one cow scored at 95 points. Several cows with the Maple-Dell prefix have been awarded prestigious titles, with 17 All-American, 18 Reserve All-Americans, and multiple cows ranking on the Cow Performance Index (CPI) with high lifetime milk production.

Maple-Dell farm is widely recognized for producing high-profile cattle, the most recent family line being the "D's", leading with Maple-Dell Zorro Dafourth. The iconic cow was selected as Grand Champion at the 2006 All-American Dairy show and World Dairy Expo (WDE) Reserve Grand Champion. Following four generations, cows produced from the family line have ranked at high levels on the CPI cow list. The breeding line has also produced accomplished bulls seeing that three bulls from the family, Maple-Dell Modem Drew, Maple-Dell Modem Diego, and Maple-Dell O Dixon, have all had active A.I. usage.

Other infamous cows of the Maple-Dell herd include Maple-Dell Hi-Kick Sweet Pea, which represented the Ayrshire breed on the Purina Mills "Dairy Breeds of North

America" painting by Bonnie Mohr. The cow continued on as Grand Champion at the Eastern National show in 1988 and is the dam of popular A.I. sire, Maple-Dell Soldier.

Success for the Patrick family goes far beyond the breeding pen. Showing Ayrshire cattle for over 75 years, their pre-fix has traveled as far as international shows,

demonstrating the quality and excellence of the family's herd. Maple-Dell Farm has championed many winning cows at various shows, including the All-American Dairy show for over 50 consecutive years, and winning the show's Obie Snider award in 2006. The accolades continued onto the Maryland State Fair with 12 grand champions, and WDE with back-to-back Grand Champions, Maple-Dell Luby in 1981 and Ardrossan Kellogg Soft Eye in 1982. The awards at WDE continued with two Junior Champions, Maple-Dell BBK Shea in 2006 and Maple-Dell Diligent Gift in 2007. One of Maple-Dell's cows made Ayrshire breed history, with Maple-Dell I.R.S. Sweetnine who won at the Royal Agricultural Winter Fair in Canada. This same cow was a junior champion Ayrshire at WDE.

The Patrick family is familiar with service and leadership, being active members of the U.S. Ayrshire Breeders' Association for several decades. The Patrick family has supported a multitude of associations, including the Maryland Purebred Dairy Cattle Association, Wills Fair Association, Maryland/Delaware Ayrshire Association, and All-American Dairy Show Board.

Being recognized for this leadership in 2007, Maple-Dell farm was inducted to and now holds a place in the Maryland Governor's Agricultural Hall of Fame. In 2020, National Dairy Shrine awarded Maple-Dell its highest honor for a cattle breeder with its Distinguished Cattle Breeder Award.

Beyond their farmland, the Patrick family is actively involved in their surrounding community by providing opportunities for youth in agriculture. Whether hosting fitting and judging workshops or leasing over 20 head of dairy cattle each year to 4-H members for show, the Patrick's have inspired positive agricultural experiences among the younger generations.

Maple-Dell farm has driven success in the Ayrshire breed, having proven influential to the dairy community around them. Their motivation for producing quality Ayrshire cattle has resulted in astounding achievements for their herd and their combined love for dairy and family has un-

doubtedly earned Maple-Dell Farms the title of the 2024 McKown Master Breeder Award.

Past winners of the Robert "Whitey" McKown Master Breeder Award include: Spring Valley and Heath Jerseys, Westminster, Md., 2023; Palmyra Farm, Hagerstown, Md., 2022; Cutting Edge Brown Swiss, Copake, N.Y., 2021; (no winner named in 2020 due to the COVID-19 pandemic) Woodmansee Holsteins, Preston, Conn., 2019; Ovaltop Holsteins, Richfield Springs, N.Y., 2018; Wendon Holsteins, Innisfail, Alberta, 2017; Ferme Jacobs Inc., Cap-Santé, Quebec, 2016; Walk-Era, Wisconsin Dells, Wis., 2015; Pond View Farm, Danville, Vt., 2014; Quality Holsteins, Vaughan, Ontario, 2013; Windsor Manor Farms, New Windsor, Md., 2012; Moondale, Monona, Iowa, 2011; Snider Homestead, New Enterprise, Pa., 2010; and Windy Knoll View, Mercersburg, Pa., 2009. No award was given in the pandemic year of 2020.

The Robert "Whitey" McKown Breeder Award was made possible by the family and friends of the 1997 Honorary Klussendorf honoree after his passing in 2009. McKown joined the Holstein World staff in 1956 and became widely respected as he traveled nationally and internationally, reporting on shows, sales, meetings, and other Holstein events. The 1987 National Dairy Shrine president also developed McKown Holsteins at Belleville, N.Y. He had great admiration for the farmer breeder.

The Klussendorf Memorial Association, considered by many as the Hall of Fame for dairy cattle exhibitors, began in 1937 in memory of Arthur B. Klussendorf, considered the outstanding dairy cattle showman of his time. Each year, the Klussendorf Association votes to add a new dairy cattle exhibitor to its rolls with lifetime membership for their cumulative works. ■

SEIZING THE MOMENT

Lessons from the 2024 World Ayrshire Federation Conference

“When you get the chance, do it.”

This is advice my grandparents often share with me, especially as I navigate my twenties. Their words ring truer every day; life is short, and the world is full of wonders waiting to be explored. So, when the opportunity arose to represent the United States at the 2024 World Ayrshire Federation Conference, it was an easy “yes” for me.

The World Ayrshire Federation Conference, held every four years, brings together Ayrshire breeders, enthusiasts and icons from around the globe. Each conference is hosted in a different country, showcasing Ayrshires in various environments and management styles. This year’s took place in the United Kingdom over 19 days. While I only attended for a week, many delegates stayed longer, with some even extending their European adventures beyond the three weeks.

This year’s conference offered a perfect mix of farm visits, free days and tourist activities. One hundred ten delegates from nine countries traveled 1,890 miles by coach, visiting 16 farms, enjoying eight tourism days and staying in eight different hotels along the way. The best part was that we were all there because of our shared passion for the Ayrshire cow.

How amazing is that?

What began as an exhausting 26-hour journey to the UK transformed into the trip of a lifetime. As I acclimate back to daily life, I’ve had the opportunity to reflect on the profound impact of this trip. I hope these insights inspire, motivate or simply provide you with something to ponder, too.

Takeaway #1: Connecting with people who share your same passion is sometimes the only therapy you need.

First, let me say that Ayrshire people are truly some of the best people. Perhaps I’m biased, having grown up with the breed, but this conference proved my point. Everyone there was so welcoming and a joy to be around. I strengthened relationships with breeders from my home country, reconnected with international friends and forged new connections with global breeders I had followed for years.

“When you get the chance, do it.”

As someone who really cherishes deep, meaningful conversation, I was thrilled when a group of us from the U.S. and Canada discussed the challenges and triumphs in the dairy industry over dinner one night. Women I’ve long admired shared their struggles as females in the industry, and successful breeders offered life advice I’ll cherish forever.

Leaving those conversations, and many others that week, I felt inspired and refreshed

by the stories I heard. It’s a powerful reminder that nothing compares to connecting with others who share your passions, experiences and challenges. It’s good for the soul – a chance to recharge and restore.

Takeaway #2: Ayrshires are a cow for the future. It’s up to us to make sure everyone knows.

One of my favorite parts was the third day of the trip, which featured the World Ayrshire Federation General Meeting. Each country presented on the Ayrshire population in their part of the world, the dairy climate and updates since the last conference in 2020.

I learned so much about Ayrshire cows worldwide and their global impact. A consistent theme emerged from every country’s presentation: The Ayrshire cow’s health, durability and dependability, which reinforced why we all love and appreciate them. They’re efficient, low-maintenance and adaptable to various setups, environments and management styles. They’re easy-keepers.

At the Genetic Sale later that evening, U.S. genetics were prominently featured. Kurt Wolf’s Iowa consignment of four sexed Kingsire x Margot Precious EX-93 embryos topped the sale, selling for \$2,198 to Stuart Mullen of the UK. The second-highest (tie) selling embryo lot was from Tanner Topp in Ohio – four sexed Reynolds embryos from a Player daughter of the renowned renowned Toppglen Wishful Thinking-ET EX-95, purchased by Kevin Lang of South Africa for \$1,097.

Also selling for \$1,097 was Palmyra Farm's four Blackjack or Robinson embryos from Palmyra Ringer B Rayna-ET VG-87. They were purchased by Marilie Ayrshires of Canada.

As the dairy industry evolves, pushing farmers to improve efficiency and productivity, our breeders have a unique opportunity to showcase why Ayrshires are the cow of the future. We must continue to promote the Ayrshire cow's key strengths: their ruggedness, versatility, moderate size, exceptional milk quality and longevity. Ayrshires can excel on large dairies, stand out on small farms and are a joy for show enthusiasts.

If there was ever any question of where the Ayrshire breed is headed, recent sale prices and global show recognition underscore the growing demand. At the 2023 World Dairy Expo, both the Ayrshire cow and heifer won Supreme Champion honors in the junior show, marking a first in Expo history. Earlier in 2023, the famous Kassy was crowned Supreme Champion of International Dairy Week in Australia – another historic first.

At the Conference, we learned the Ayrshire cow and heifer that had earlier clinched the Champion title at the Great Yorkshire Show went on to win the Supreme Champion award, further solidifying Ayrshires' competitive edge across the globe.

It's clear that Ayrshires have a bright future, and it's up to us, U.S. breeders, to ensure that we capitalize on this momentum moving forward.

Takeaway #3: Embrace new perspectives, ideas and backgrounds. There's a place for all of us.

As I continue to seek purpose and meaning in my life, I see the Ayrshire cow and the dairy industry playing a significant role. This trip made that abundantly clear.



I encountered a diverse range of people, each bringing their unique background and perspective. I met young enthusiasts, experienced

breeders and retirees who once milked a barn full of Ayrshires. One conversation in particular stood out when I met a young woman from Minnesota who had recently become involved with Ayrshires through her work at Gay Rodgers' Hameau Farm in Pennsylvania. Like me, she was preparing to return to her home state and pursue her own farming journey on her family's 40-cow organic dairy.

This conversation struck me for two reasons:

- 1) How ironic is it that I had to travel thousands of miles from home to connect with someone who lives just a state away?
- 2) I found it incredibly refreshing to hear from someone my age who is new to the Ayrshire breed and eagerly seeking opportunities to learn more. Her enthusiasm is clear in her proactive approach to deepening her understanding and experience with the breed. She plans to take over her family's farm and create a farm-to-consumer experience with Ayrshires as a part of it. We both agreed to keep each other in mind and offer support whenever possible.

It was powerful to see so many people from various backgrounds come together over a singular purpose. Experienced farmers exchanged ideas with young enthusiasts, sparking new perspectives and broadening horizons. I realized that ensuring the breed's future requires all of us – from enthusiasts with a few show heifers to farmers with small or large herds.

There's a place for everyone, and our diverse perspectives are valuable and required to sustain the Ayrshire breed.

Life often pulls us in different directions, but this trip was an important reminder to seize opportunities. Despite the many reasons I could have used to postpone the experience – moving multiple times, saving for a farm and the general busyness of life – the trip proved my grandparents' advice true.

When you get the chance, take it, embrace it and make the most of it. You never know how it might impact the rest of your life. ■

My parents (Matt & Tracy), siblings, the crew at Maunsha Creek, family, friends, breeders, and my home farm for understanding the times when I am missing milking and chores. I express my gratitude to each of you for believing in myself, Fudge, and your unwavering support every single day.

What is Fudge up to these days? She continues to put her share of pounds in the bulk tank and is currently on an IVF program with embryos available from Inspire, Money, and Stargazer. Thank you to the breeders who have invested in her genetics and guided me along the way, as Fudge's pedigree is being built from the ground up! ■

COW OF THE YEAR

West Wade Taser Laney was purchased as a bred heifer in the 2018 Wisconsin State Sale from a small herd in Missouri (I had the bidder number...dad was a ringman...pretty sure he was surprised I was bidding and got her!). She's a SAK Kourt Taser daughter out of a Royal Treble that goes back to Climer's Tres Colles herd.

Laney is currently in her 6th lactation. She is not a huge cow in stature, but huge in dairy strength, has a great udder and feet and legs (along with a very correct rump). She is currently classified 2E90 (90SS - 21DQ - 90RP - 90MO - 89US).

She earned the majority of her points for this honor in her components - primarily fat. Every lactation she has either had a 5.0% or 5.1% fat test. In fact, Laney earned her Bronze Hardy Cow award in 4 lactations on fat (though milk not far behind). She calved in early June and has started out this lactation with two tests over 80 pounds of milk with that same high fat test.

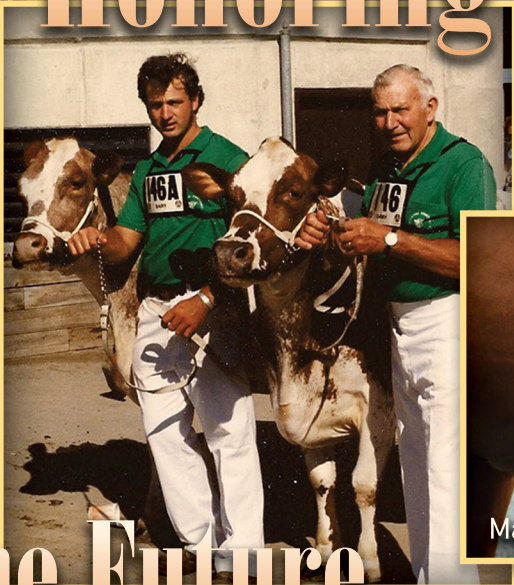
Laney has earned her end stall in the barn - she's quiet, extremely low maintenance, and causes visitors to do a double-take when they walk in the barn. She tolerates the cats and young (sometimes obnoxious) cow next to her, and always gets a neck rub from the milkman! (He was even worried when she got her dry period outside as he didn't see her for a couple of months!)

Unfortunately, she doesn't throw many heifers, but she does have one very promising one sired by Zulu and due next March to Luckyman. With her production and components (along with her type), she should make some great herd sires in the future.

Laney does all of this in a tie stall barn and is milked twice a day. She (along with the rest of the herd) is fed high moisture corn and protein in the barn along with corn and hay silage. Free choice hay is available to her year round. During the nicer months during the year, she is outside with access to a sand-bedded freestall barn. She certainly turned out to be a fantastic addition to our herd and continues to impress us everyday - it's quite a view looking out the end of the barn and seeing her gorgeous profile!

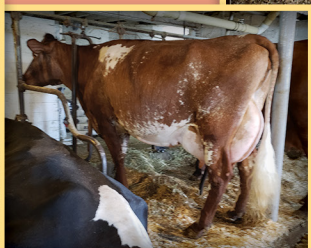

My Mother started with Milking Shorthorns as a freshman in High School, in the mid 1960's, owning, showing and breeding. Years later, she met my father (Bud) at the Haddam Neck Fair while showing cattle. After marrying and starting a family, they continued to be involved with Milking Shorthorns throughout the years in various ways. Most recently, she and my father purchased three native heifers at the AMSS convention and sale when it was held in Plano, TX. From those three heifers, she has bred, raised, sold, and promoted her dual purpose native, heritage cattle for the past twenty years.

My mother has purchased "dual purpose/native" bulls from as far as Nevada and Ohio to bring to her farm in central Connecticut. Her cattle genetics can trace to JBARJ, Albaugh Ranch, Cantagree, Delldale, and Idalee.

She has sold "starter herds" to people in Maryland, Virginia, North Carolina, and Alabama. Her bulls are on farms from New York to Alabama, and her cows are on farms from Vermont to Alabama - some went to be shown, some went to be milked, some to be part of other cow/calf operations ... while some to be just "lawn ornaments"! She raises most male calves for beef. Females are raised for brood cows or sold to interested buyers. She also sells cow/calf pairs

My mother served as Secretary of the New England Milking Shorthorn Association for close to thirty years, as well as President, Vice President and Director. She is a member of the Heritage Shorthorn Association and the Native/Dual Purpose Committee of AMSS. She has been a Farm Bureau member and served as President, Director, and Delegate. My mother is also a member of the Haddam Neck Fair Board of Directors and has served as their livestock liaison for decades.

Her farm is a cow/calf operation, and she is my neighbor. When my parents married, they purchased a farm neighboring my grandparents' farm where my father was raised. Fifteen years ago, I purchased my grandparents' farm, which was a mix of orchards and vegetable gardens. When I purchased my grandparents' farm, most of the orchards had been removed and the gardens had become overgrown. Since 2009, I have created and managed a Community Supported Agriculture program on my farm. Throughout that time, some of my mother's "Airline Farm" cattle have pastured on my farm, McLean Hill Farm & Gardens, in the fields that once were orchards. Each summer season, I have about one hundred and twenty families picking up vegetables each week.

Having her cattle on my property not only creates a better, more well-rounded and full farm experience for my customers, but having them seen and accessible helps to educate and introduce my customers and our community on local food production and local food sources. It is a unique opportunity for me to offer locally raised,

USDA processed beef to my customers and community - which they really, substantially support - and a pleasure for my mother to introduce even yet still more people to the breed she loves.

Her cows all have names, are raised with respect, and are treated with dignity. While they are livestock, they are also very much the backdrop of our family: They were the animals we cared for before and after school, they were always and are still in the pastures across the farm when we have holiday picnics or family parties. The only real "vacations" we took as a family were to annual Milking Shorthorn Association meetings, every May.

I think my mother deserves to be recognized for her unwavering, decades-long dedication to the breed, her continued support of the community around the breed, and ...just for the pure passion she has for dual purpose Milking Shorthorns

She is the one who stays home to keep the farm running when Mom and Dad travel to AMSS conventions, shows, meetings, and even internationally.

2024 NATIONAL AYRSHIRE AWARDS

YOUNG AYRSHIRE BREEDER AWARD

This was the presentation for the award winner at the national convention given by Erica Davis.

The 2024 Young Ayrshire Breeder award goes to a young man who knows a lot about family. He is the third of six children, has three children of his own (with another soon to come) and has five nieces and nephews, and counting. But this young Ohio Ayrshire breeder also knows a lot about cow families.

He was an early investor in Ayrshire genetics, starting at just seven years old. He bought Maple-Dell Soldier's Nan to take home to dad and the 100 percent Holstein herd. A little later, but still at a very young age, he bought Conebella Sarge's Wendy, for \$1500. From this EX-93, 4E matriarch he has bred, developed or influenced one name cows like Wishful Thinking or Wish or Wynonna. Cows that people outside the Ayrshire breed recognize.

Tanner Topp, with a strong family influence and backing, is behind the Toppglen prefix. He and his family have been in the Ayrshire business since he brought that first calf home at seven. He has always been interested in cows that are balanced, productive, profitable, healthy and long lived. He wants cows that compete in herds with other breeds and says, "They better be good, because life is too short to milk ugly cows."

There have been some really good cows to come out of the small Toppglen herd. From that purchase of Conebella Sarge's Wendy, EX-93, 4E, who has many show winnings of her own, Tanner bred Toppglen Prime's Wish-ET, EX-94. She was sold to Old-Bankston Ayrshires as a Junior 3-Year-Old and is the dam of the highest selling Ayrshire in history, Old-Bankston-AL Wynonna, who sold for \$67,000.

The full sister to Wish is also a "pretty decent" cow, Toppglen Wishful Thinking-ET, EX-95. She has winnings that would take us a few minutes to get through, but the top listing is of course that she was Supreme Champion of the Junior Show at the 2023 World Dairy Expo. Wish and Wishful Thinking have already made impacts on the Ayrshire breed, not only because of their show ring successes, but also because of their cow family influence.

These are only a few of the most notorious females Tanner has bred and developed, and any pedigree and genetics guru can tell you, there are so many more.

Kurt Wolf, a fellow young Ayrshire breeder who has invested in and marketed from Toppglen bred Ayrshires, says he appreciates that Tanner is not afraid to sell, or at least price, his good ones. He also says, "Tanner will also reinvest in another breeder's Ayrshire, especially when she has strong influence from Toppglen genetics, showing how confident he is in that family influence."

Peter Vail has purchased embryo packages and a few live heifers from Tanner in online sales. He purchased a Wishful Thinking daughter in the 2023 Ohio Fall Sale who he then sold in his own sale this spring. As a man who operates his cattle acquisitions as a business, he appreciates that while Toppglen genetics demand a premium price, the cattle are the type that continue to develop and strengthen in value, allowing the new owner to still work a profit in their own ventures. "He does a great job promoting his sale consignments and makes the most of marketing opportunities," Peter commented.

Tanner has been quoted as saying, "We take pride in breeding cows that can go into any type of herd and compete with the rest of the cows, no matter what breed they are. Our future is in the next generation, and we hope we can pave the way for them to have the kind of success and appreciation for the great Ayrshire cow that we have been fortunate to have."

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD

The following is the presentation made for the Distinguished Service Award by Rhonda Winkler at the National Ayrshire convention.

The definition of dedication is “devoted to a task or purpose; having single-minded loyalty or integrity.” Tonight’s recipient is the definition of dedication. Dedication to the Ayrshire Breeders Association, dedication to every committee he has chaired and served on, dedication to every breeder to make sure he gives them his all.

Our Distinguished Service Award Recipient has been serving his whole life. He has served on many boards and has been a leader in his community. He once was an agriculture teacher and a county 4-H agent. It seems to me he surely loves educating those around him about agriculture.

He has served on the ABA Board for 11 years, with 1 more to go. He has served as a director, vice president, president and currently as our ex-officio. Tom Gillette of Lyons Falls, NY has dedicated the past 11 years to the Ayrshire Breeders Association. He is a man who has always loved good cows and good business. He is always looking for ways to help the association out. He was working with South Dakota State University to get them to do a project on the Ayrshire Cow. Always thinking and always doing, that’s our guy, Tom Gillette.

Tom’s grandfather bought their home farm in 1909, he grew up on the farm and fell in love with the dairy cattle and the farming operation. He went to Morrisville for two years and then transferred to Cornell. His first official job was as an agricultural teacher. He then formed a partnership with his father while he worked part-time as a county 4-H extension agent. During that time, he taught 4-H’ers how to judge and at least two of his 4-H’ers have judged at World Dairy EXPO. He then took over the farm starting with a 40-cow operation in the beginning and growing it to a 300-cow operation at the conclusion. In 2009 they were given the Century Farm Award. Now Tom wasn’t always an Ayrshire guy, he dabbled with the Holsteins and when the milk co-ops were paying more for solids, it made sense to Tom to experiment with the color breeds. The Ayrshires seemed to be far ahead of the other colored breeds. The Ayrshires seemed to fit in well, they were rarely if ever in the sick cow barn. A couple of his first purchases lived to be 13 years old. He liked to show and one of his cows was a 4-time All-American and another cow was a 3-time All-American.

Tom also served on the Loyal Producer’s board in the 90’s. There is a bit of family history there. Ms. Jane, Tom’s beautiful wife’s grandfather started the co-op in 1936 and then Tom served as President. They supplied all of the milk for the craft cream cheese plant. During that time, he negotiated a new contract with DFA in 1995.

Tom served his community in Lewis County by serving on the County Development Board and did a few wind and solar farm projects. Tom is currently a real-estate agent; it seems that our guy Tom just doesn’t know how to slow down.

I have served with Tom for the past seven years on the Ayrshire Breeders Association Board. In all of my years, knowing Tom and serving with him, he rarely if ever has missed a meeting and that says a lot since we have been having two meetings a week since November. He has even gotten the hang of the zoom meetings! He participates and always has a lot of knowledge to share with his fellow board members. Everyone of us on the board are grateful for Tom’s dedication and service to ABA. I truly believe that Tom has no limits to what he would do to serve, protect and keep the Ayrshire Breeders Association running efficiently and profitably. Thank you, Tom, for your dedication and commitment.

MASTER BREEDER AWARD

This was the presentation at the 2024 National Ayrshire Convention.

This year's Master Breeder bought his first Ayrshire on a dare at 16. A stint in the army detoured him from starting his dream of dairy farming, but he knew as soon as he got home that his destiny was tied to the Ayrshire cow. He has never owned another breed.

He has been active in his state Ayrshire club and has served as a member of the US Ayrshire Board of Directors. He advocates for the qualities that make the Ayrshire breed a logical choice for many commercial dairymen.

His herd consists of 110 milking cows and averages 65-75 lbs of milk with 4% fat. His breeding philosophy emphasizes milk production, good feet & legs, and sound udders. He feels that one of the Ayrshire traits that make the breed a standout is the overall udder quality. The herd is 87% purebred or above. He recently had two bulls selected for export to Russia and five others to go to Genex. The bulls are all predicted over +1000M. This is the culmination of his goal to breed high-producing cows that transmit their ability to produce high-quality milk to their offspring.

He is not afraid to buy a good cow, in fact, his favorite cow, Palmyra Bendig Rena, was purchased from Mary Creek. Now eight years old, Rena has the udder of a two-year-old, still above the hock and producing 28,000-30,000 lbs of milk, year in and year out. He also purchased a Palmyra bull that sired many high-producing daughters.

He, his wife, children, and grandchildren farm 336 acres in Newton, Iowa. They rotate corn, alfalfa, and soybeans, emphasizing high-quality roughage. When he bought the farm, our recipient felt he was a lucky guy to be able to afford a farm of that quality.

He is beyond proud of his children and grandchildren and will tell anyone who asks how proud he is of their accomplishments and work ethic. They all work on the farm making breeding suggestions, raising calves, and whatever else is necessary.

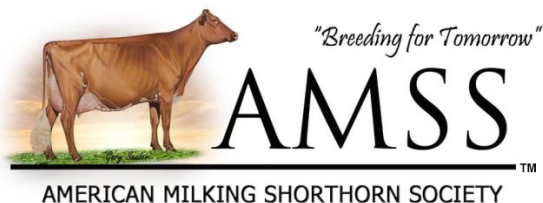

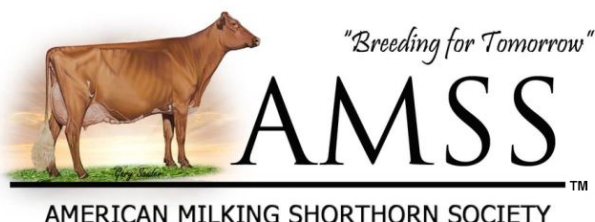

John was born July 22, 1943 in Oconomowoc, WI to Mervin and Lorraine (nee Fleming) Dalton. Survived by his wife of 51 years Roberta (Bobbi) nee Fetherston, sons Tim Dalton

(Kristy), Randy Richert (Andrea), and Nick Tetzlaff (Sarah) who was like a son, sister Peggy Harris (Phil), grandchildren Jessica, Shelby, and Finnegan, many nieces and nephews, and innumerable friends. He is preceded in death by his parents and brothers Don and Tom.

John moved to North Lake when he was 6 when his parents bought a farm that had originally been homesteaded by Lorraine's grandfather. He was always an avid learner, joking about being the Valedictorian of Tamarak Tech (the one room schoolhouse on the corner of Hwy 83 and CW). He graduated from Arrowhead High School in Hartland, WI in 1962 and earned his B.S. in Agriculture/Dairy Science from the University of Wisconsin in 1966.

John joined the Wisconsin National Guard after high school, serving throughout his time in college, before volunteering for active duty during the Vietnam Conflict. He was sent to Vietnam as a Staff Sergeant with the replacements for Hamburger Hill. During his two tours (1969-1970) he fought at multiple hotspots in the A Shau Valley to include Firebase Granite, Fire Support Base Kathryn, and finally he volunteered to go assist his sister Battalion at the infamous Firebase Ripcord, which was attacked for 23 days by two divisions of North Vietnamese Regular Army. Unfortunately, it was during this battle that his best friend in Vietnam was killed, just days before he was due to return home. John escaped the mountaintop on the second to last helicopter out of Ripcord as it was being overrun. He carried the burden of these memories throughout his life, rarely talking about them, and it wasn't until very late in life that his pride for being a member

of the famous 101st Airborne Division came to light, and from then on, you rarely saw him without his "Screaming Eagles" cap on.

Returning home to the farm he loved, Daltondale, John focussed his attention on milking, breeding and showing purebred Ayrshire cattle with his father and brother Tom. (His brother Don and sister Peggy had followed their mother into the field of teaching.) John had been awarded the Premier Exhibitor award during the Ayrshire show at the Wisconsin State Fair in 1964 and was determined to vie for that title again.

John married Roberta Fetherston on November 24th, 1973 and she and her son Randy (Richert) moved on to the farm. Son Tim was born in August of 1975. Through the years John was an involved parent attending the boys' activities and sporting events. Of course, the boys also spent time with John on the farm helping in the barns, fields, and show rings, but farming was not their passion. Randy entered the USAF after graduation from Gustavus Adolphus College and had a long, successful career retiring in 2015 as a Colonel. Following in John's footsteps, Tim graduated from the University of Wisconsin. He is a Special Agent in Diplomatic Security for the U.S. State Department. Both boys have lived in various overseas locations and John and Bobbi enjoyed traveling to visit them. (Always managing to sneak in a farm visit.)

With both boys leaving, Daltondale needed more help. They found it in Nick Tetzlaff, a local student who was looking for summer employment. Nick started in 1997 and continued to work for John throughout high school, undergraduate and graduate degrees in Dairy Science from UW Whitewater. After John's brother Tom passed away, Nick became indispensable in helping John to continue running Daltondale. Working side by side through the years their relationship changed from employer-employee to John looking on Nick as another son.

Throughout all this time John continued to be active in the dairy industry on the local, state, national and international levels:

* He was a local 4-H dairy leader for 25 years helping to mold several

generations of future farmers.

* He continued to show at the Waukesha County and Wisconsin State fairs, being inducted into the WI State Fair Hall of Fame in 2018.

* He was an exhibitor at World Dairy Expo throughout the first 50 years of that event, served as Director for several years, was a member of WDE's Dairy Cattle Exhibitor Committee since its creation in 1984, serving as committee chairman for seven years, and served on WDE's Executive Board for many years. In 2016 he received the A.C. "Whitie" Thompson Award for his exemplary leadership and sportsmanship throughout the show.

* Daltondale Farm has hosted delegates to WDE as one of the farms on its annual tour.

* In 2013 John received the Premier Breeder of the International Ayrshire Show World Dairy Expo.

* His long association with the Ayrshire Breeders Association Board of Directors saw him serving as President, 2nd Vice President, 1st Vice President and an active member in many committees.

* In 2012 he received the U.S. Ayrshire Breeders Association Master Breeder Award.

* He is a past Director of the World Federation of Ayrshire Breed Societies.

* He was instrumental in establishing a Foreign Agriculture Service international marketing program and served as the program coordinator for many years. In 1991 he traveled to Russia on a FAS sponsored trip.

* He has been a Wisconsin Purebred Dairy Cattle Association Director and past President.

* John served as Director of the National Dairy Shrine at one time..

* He was a Director and past President of the Midwest Ayrshire Club.

As a farmer, John's love of the showing and developing the breed genetically was evident. Daltondale Farms have exhibited cattle at the local, state and national levels. Animals with the Daltondale prefix have topped the Elite Cow List, sent bulls into A.I., won national production awards and have been named All-Americans. In 2016, the Reserve Grand-Champion Ayrshire at World Dairy Expo was a granddaughter of the Dalton prefix.

John was also involved in the local community serving on the local School Board and Board of Adjustment for the Town of Merton. He was also a member of the local VFW.

During all this time, Bobbi, his wife of 50 years, was by his side. They raised two sons, Randy (Andrea) and Tim (Kristy) and spent time with their grandchildren Jessica, Shelby and Finnigan. They hosted numerous nieces and nephews on the farm over the years.


